We would be remiss if we did not acknowledge what a tragic year 2023 was for Sault Ste. Marie and our members. We all experienced incredible loss felt throughout our community. We wish to thank community members for coming together to help us all heal during such difficult times. The healing continues, but without your support it would be much more difficult. Together we are strong.

Intimate Partner Violence (IPV) came to the forefront of our service, and we are improving how we handle these calls for service. We have learned, while reported calls of IPV have increased slightly compared to 2022, the data from our partners tells a different story. IPV is on the rise, and we must do whatever we can to support victims.

With each annual report we strive to provide a transparent look into the year of your police service. This year members of our Crime Suppression Unit and Drug Enforcement Unit, along with partner agencies, seized more than \$1,000,000 worth of illicit drugs off the streets of Ontario. Project Otter proves how successful provincial collaboration can be to keep our family and friends safe. We also expanded our Canine Unit - adding another handler and two more canines to the team. Police Service Dogs are invaluable in finding missing people, evidence, and criminals harming our community.

Throughout the 2023 Annual Report we outline the challenges we as a community are facing, along with the ways the Sault Police strive to improve the life and safety of the people of Prince Township and Sault Ste. Marie. This data

supports the decisions we make to enhance public safety and to bring those profiting from crime before the courts.







Highlights

Project Otter Drug Bust

Through intense investigations by the Crime Suppression Unit (CSU) and Drug Enforcement Unit (DEU) of the Sault Ste. Marie Police Service, as well as partners with the Durham Regional Police Service and Thunder Bay Police Service, more than \$1,000,000 of drugs has been seized. The seizure includes more than 700 grams of fentanyl, a record one time seizure for Sault Police.

During the execution of the two search warrants in Sault Ste. Marie, one of a residence in the 600 block McDonald Avenue and one of the vehicle seized, officers located and arrested five accused.



During the search warrants, officers located and seized:

- Approximately 703 grams of fentanyl
- Approximately 900 grams of methamphetamine
- Approximately 320 grams of Cocaine
- Approximately \$74,000 in Canadian currency
- A stolen vehicle

The estimated street value of the drugs seized in Sault Ste. Marie is \$470,000

The Durham Regional Police Service executed two search warrants, one in Oshawa and another in Whitby. During the execution of the two search warrants, Durham Police officers located and seized:

- Approximately six (6) kilograms of methamphetamine
- Approximately \$50,000 in Canadian, American, and Jamaican currency

The estimated street value of the drugs seized in Durham Region is \$620,000.

The total estimated street value of the drugs seized during Project Otter is \$1,090,000.

Project Otter was not possible without the support and commitment of our partner agencies, the Criminal Intelligence Service of Ontario (CISO), the Durham Regional Police Service and the Thunder Bay Police Service.



New Online Registries

Wandering and/or Vulernable Person Registry

In May 2023, Sault Police introduced its new Wandering and/or Vulnerable Person Registry, which provides critical information to first responders if a vulnerable person goes missing.

The registry is for wandering and/or vulnerable people who are living with autism, Alzheimer's Disease or other forms of dementia, an acquired brain injury, intellectual disability, and/or other vulnerabilities who may exhibit patterns of behaviour that may pose a risk to themselves or others.

By registering a wandering and/or vulnerable person, families or caregivers grant Sault Police the ability to quickly access critical information about the person's description, routines, communication, medical needs, favourite places, additional needs, and emergency contact information to efficiently assist in a crisis.

Security Camera Registry

In August 2023, Sault Police introduced a voluntary Security Camera Registry with the goal of improving the efficiency of police investigations. The Security Camera Registry is a community-based crime prevention opportunity and investigative resource, enlisting the support of the people of Sault Ste. Marie and Prince Township.

Registered addresses are mapped for Sault Police members to quickly and effectively direct resources when investigating incidents in a neighbourhood. Participation in this program can deter and prevent crime.

Missing Child Found Safe After 29-Hour Search

On the morning of May 12, 2023, a local 11-year-old went missing from an outdoor learning centre, triggering a 29-hour multi-agency search-and-rescue operation throughout a wooded area.

About 50 searchers - including Canine Units - from Sault Police, Ontario Provincial Police (OPP), the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, and Sault Search and Rescue looked for the missing child by foot, ATV, drone, and helicopter.

After a good samaritan on an ATV noticed a footprint about eight kilometres from the spot the child was last seen, an OPP helicopter was dispatched to the area and located the child 9 kilometres from the outdoor learning centre.

Sault Police are grateful for the help from other agencies, for the community's support, and for the child's bravery, tenacity, and



GSPS Truth and Reconciliation Relay

In 2023, Greater Sudbury Police Service hosted its 2nd annual Truth and Reconciliation Relay with over 1,000 participants from 41 organizations.

The relay aims to promote healing and advance reconciliation by providing participants with access to educational resources about the traumatic and devastating impacts of Residential Schools. Participants are asked to review the Calls to Action and select one that speaks to them personally. Throughout the month of September, participants spent time reflecting on how to implement change in their own lives while logging their kilometers.



Sault Police was proud to have logged the highest

average number of kilometres per participant and received the Championing Change Paddle by artist Jessica Somers.

Sensory Kits in Cruisers

In December of 2023, Sault Police began carrying sensory kits in cruisers to meet the needs of individuals with autism or other sensory-processing disorders during emergencies. These kits are generously supplied by the Algoma Autism Foundation.

"The loud sirens and bright, flashing lights of emergency vehicles, in addition to heightened emotions in a crisis, can be overstimulating to people with autism or sensory-processing disorders. The sensory kits being added to these vehicles include items that can be calming, reduce intense stimuli, and aid communication for those who are non-verbal," says Jamie Boston, co-founder of the Algoma Autism Foundation.



Awards

Crime Stoppers of Sault Ste. Marie and Algoma Peace Officer of the Year Awards Gala

In 2023, Sergeant Rob Wright won a Peace Officer of the Year Award for helping save the life of a distressed individual who jumped into the St. Marys River with self-inflicted injuries.

Sergeant Brad Baber also won a Peace Officer of the Year Award for spearheading a robust re-integration program to help members return to work after being injured.

CPIC/OPTIC Clerk Marny Mills won the Crime Stoppers Recognition Award for making significant contributions to the 'Wanted Wednesday' program by helping select suspects and promptly removing them from the system following their arrest.

Police Exemplary Service Awards Luncheon

Investigative Services Clerk Sarah Miles won the Civilian of the Year Award for going above and beyond in the performance of her duties.

Civilian Relief member Christine Leonard won the Julie Christenson Memorial Award for exemplifying the outstanding qualities Julie Christenson embodied throughout her 36 years of service to the SSMPS such as remaining positive in the face of challenges as well as an encouraging and positive attitude and spirit of compassion among fellow members. Recipients of this award may possess the personal qualities of being good-natured, kind, genuine, gracious, and trustworthy.



Expansion of Canine Unit

Red

On July 21, 2023, Sault Police introduced a new member of its Canine Unit: a Fox Red Labrador named Red. Red was trained in search and rescue so he can help police find missing people.

Constable Turco recognized Red's breed as being intelligent, energetic, and loyal. Historically, Red Fox Labradors were bred as hunting companions and working dogs, making Red an excellent fit for the Canine Unit.

Constable Turco brought Red home when he was five months old. Two months later, they embarked on a 12-week training course at the Ontario Provincial Police Academy Canine Training Centre in Orillia, Ontario. Red's training included qualifying as a "cadaver dog," which means he can search for human remains.



Partway through his training, Red returned to Sault Ste. Marie to assist in a successful search for a missing child. Red graduated from his course on June 29, 2023, and, like all police canines, takes part in daily training to keep his skills sharp.

Constable Turco describes Red as "a very social, happy, and loveable dog." In his free time, Red enjoys playing with his ball and sniffing everything in sight.

Constable Beaudry & PSD Ben

Constable Nick Beaudry, who joined Sault Police as an experienced officer in 2022, competed in an arduous internal selection process before being named the service's second canine handler in August of 2023. He then embarked on an 18-week training course at the Ontario Provincial Police Academy



Canine Training Centre in Orillia, Ontario with his new partner: a Belgian Malinois named Ben.

The pair graduated after becoming proficient in suspect apprehension and searching for evidence. They then completed a five-week training course in drug detection.

This is the first time Sault Police have had two canine handlers at once, and PSD Ben raised the service's complement to four canines.

Ben's name was chosen by a community engagement initiative in which students in elementary school were invited to submit name ideas along with a colouring page. Although Cst. Beaudry had the final say on Ben's name, all submissions were entered into a random draw for one student to win a class visit from PSD Ben.










Prince Township - Top Five Calls 2023



Value of Drugs Seized











Canine Unit

Integrated Municipal Enforcement Team



In 2020, Sault Police along with Sault Fire Services, City of Sault Ste. Marie Building and By-Law, the housing commission and other partners formed the Integrated Municipal Enforcement Team (IMET).

This enforcement-oriented team brings together all agencies with enforcement mandates, with the support of other partner agencies, to develop action plans in order to address a variety of community issues and concerns.

One of the duties of IMET is to locate neglected properties and buildings in disrepair that are unsafe for tenants and community members.

The Community Safety Officers play a vital role with IMET and in educating community members of crime prevention methods.

Online Reporting

1,624 Number of Reports

The Online Reporting system went live on June 26, 2020. Since its inception, members are continuously re-evaluating the online reporting process to determine the best way to provide this service to the community. This includes potential expansion of the number, and types of calls for service which can be reported online.

Several types of reports can currently be filed online, including lost property, theft, and mischief to name a few. This allows frontline officers to respond to more serious calls in a more timely manner, thus expanding our ability to more efficiently respond to calls for service.


Day Shifts May - September 2024



Motor Vehicle Collisions








Crime Stoppers

Crime Stoppers encourages members of the community to assist local law enforcement agencies in the fight against crime by overcoming the two key elements that inhibit community involvement: fear and apathy.

Crime Stoppers provides an anonymous telephone line (705-942-7867 or 1-800-222-8477) and anonymous online reporting system (www.p3tips.com) to encourage citizens in the community to provide vital information on criminal activity. Crime Stoppers processes the reports and disseminates them to the appropriate law enforcement agencies. Tipsters remain anonymous and are eligible to receive a cash reward if the information provided leads to an arrest or successful conclusion.






